Dennis C. Moss Cultural Arts Center (The Moss Center)

The Dennis C. Moss Cultural Arts Center (The Moss Center) is a performing arts venue located in Cutler Bay and named after former Miami-Dade County Commissioner Dennis C. Moss by the Miami-Dade County Board of County Commissioners. The venue, which is governed by the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs, presents national and international artists in music, dance and theater to the community of South Miami-Dade County. The Moss Center also engages in extensive outreach and education initiatives, providing dance classes for underserved communities, as well as family programming.
